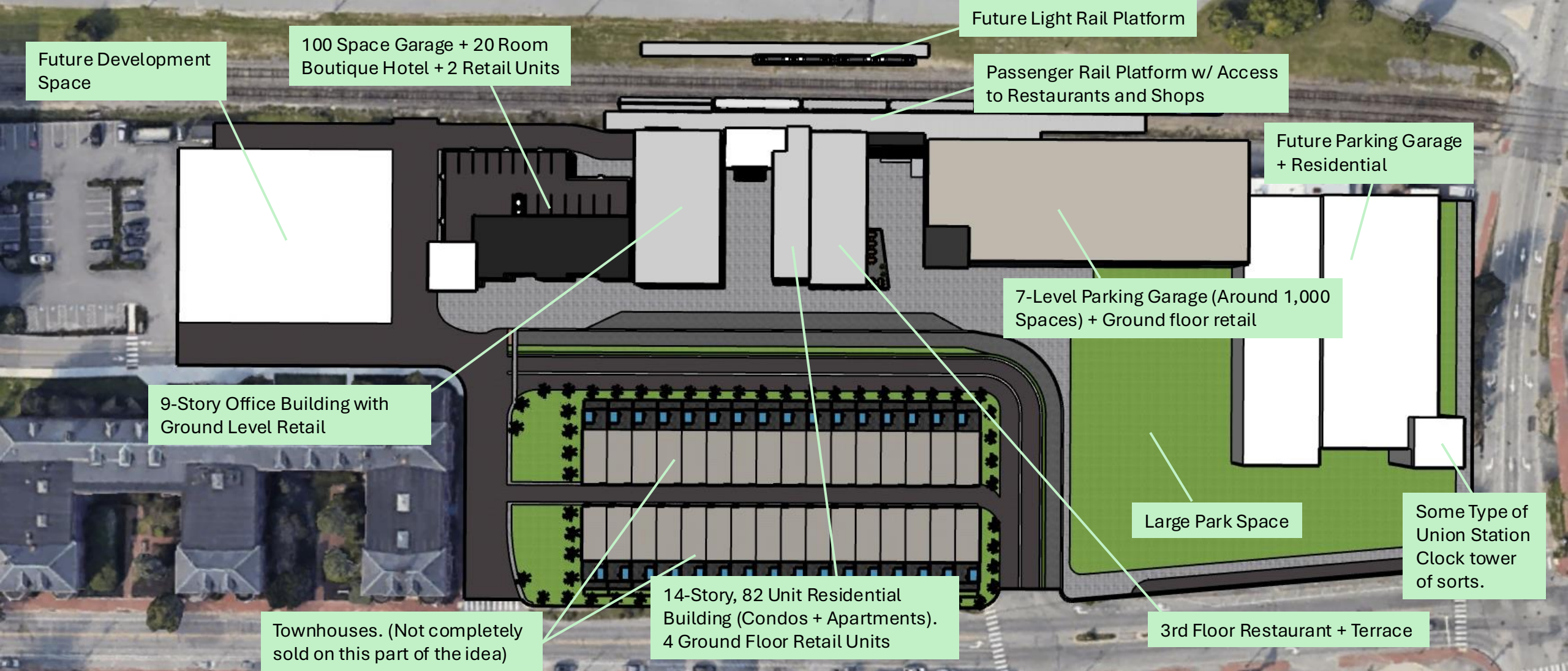


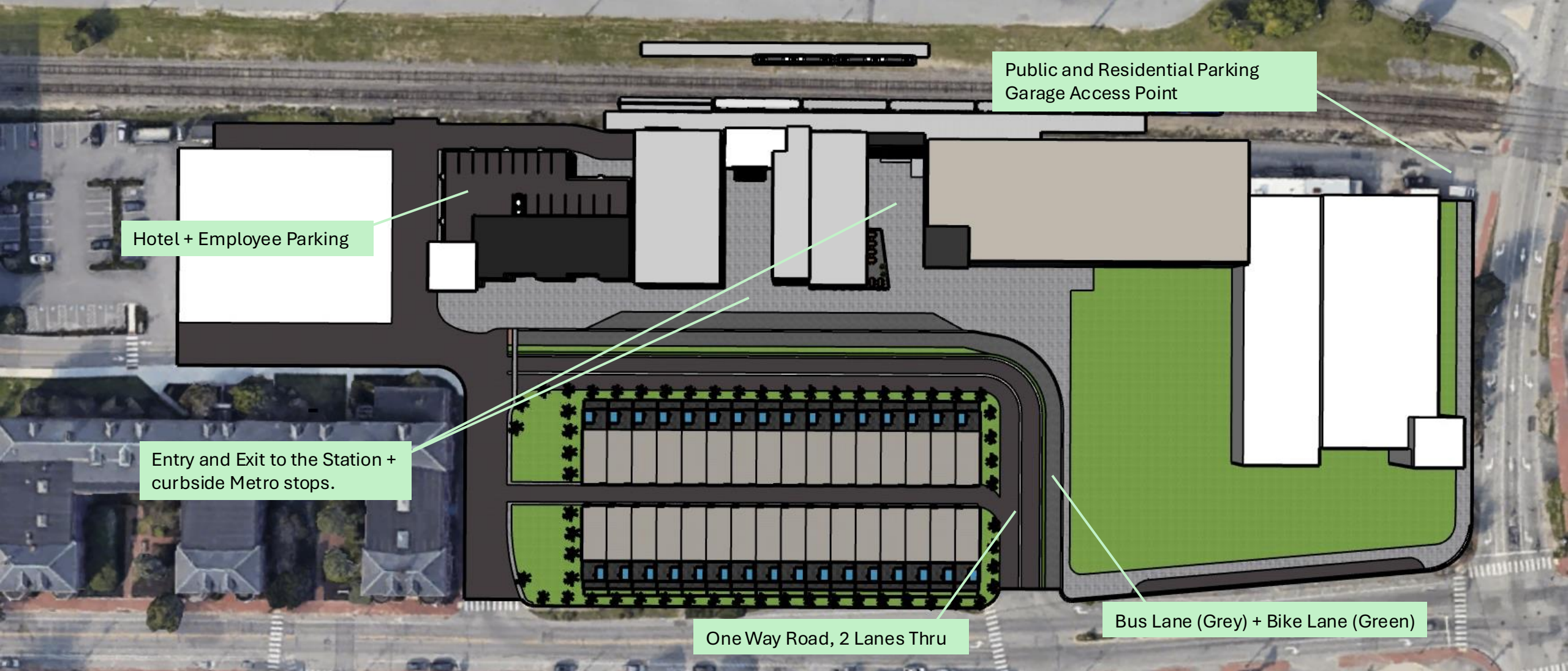

A Rough Idea and Scale of an upgrade for Portland's Union Station

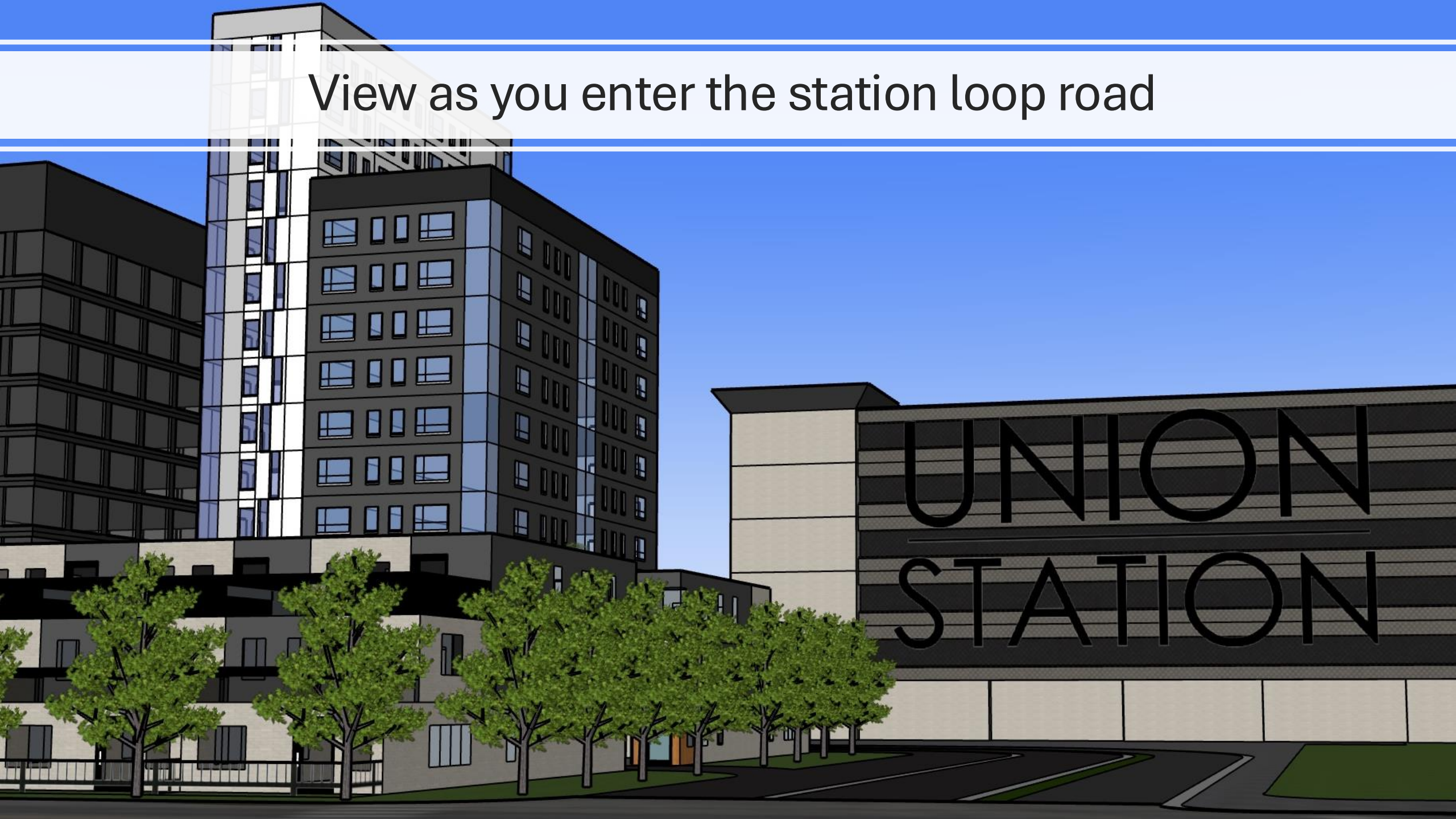
